The San Ramon Historic Foundation is dedicated to preserving and sharing the agricultural history and pioneer life in the San Ramon Valley. Forest Home Farms is San Ramon's only Historic Park and is registered with the National Register of Historic Places. The Foundation is very proud of all the members, staff and volunteers who make this wonderful 16-acre park come alive to visitors.

The Park is open six days a week and visitors can take a self-guided audio tour of all the special buildings and sites at the Farm. Enjoy the beautiful setting and natural environment. School tours are offered for the children in our Valley! They arrive with their teachers and parents for a wonderful day of exploring the farm and learning about life in the early 1900s. Special tours are offered at the Sheep Barn, where students learn about sheep shearing and preparing the wool for many different uses. The Antique Tractor Barn is a favorite of all the students as they view gigantic tractors. These tractors are in pristine condition and still run, thanks to our tractor volunteers.

Every Saturday at the farm has a theme. Volunteers help young visitors make crafts and learn about life on the farm in the olden days. These themed presentations with hands-on activities are free and offered every Saturday from 11AM to 2PM. Tours of the Glass House

Hit-and-Miss-governed Engine

Before gasoline-powered tractors arrived on American farms in significant numbers, hundreds of thousands of gasoline engines were already at work there, significantly impacting the amount of work previously done by human labor or

beasts of burden. These engines first appeared around 1872 and were used throughout the 1930s, mainly for pumping the lifeblood of any farm... water. But they were also used in myriad other ways, including the grinding of grain, elevating grain to the top of silos, separating cream from milk, churning butter, sawing

wood, splitting logs, powering shop equipment, making ice cream, washing clothes, or wherever pulley-powered equipment was found on the farm.

Naked Ladies at the Farm?

If you hurry down to Forest Home Farms, you may catch a glimpse of the Belladonna Lilies, or Naked Ladies (the nickname given to this beautiful flower because of their lack of leaves during their bloom) blooming in front of the Boone House. It is very possible that Travis's mother Minnie planted these beautiful lilies, as they were very popular in gardens all over California in the early 1900s. In fact, if you drive around any open area of Northern California during the month of August you stand a good chance of seeing them blooming alongside the road or lining a driveway. These hardy little pink beauties take very little care, which is one reason they have survived all these years in an area of the Farm that doesn't get much water.

Take care not to damage these Victorian relics when you park or walk in front of the Boone House. Given a chance, they will continue to reproduce and bloom for many years to come.



This gorgeous flower has many identities: Belladonna Lily, Naked Ladies, or Belladonna Amaryllis. This plant produces green, leafy growth that emerges in spring and dies back by mid-summer. In late summer, leafless stems produce elegant, pink flowers.

Forest Home Farms has a small collection of hit-and-miss and throttle-governed farm engines, most located in the tractor museum. These engines range from 5/8 to 6 horsepower. They are typically made of cast iron, generally have one cylinder, two large flywheels, and look very much like the steam engines they replaced. Power is taken from the engine via a pulley and a flat, wide canvas or leather belt; the other end of the belt is attached to a pulley of the equipment being driven.

Next time you visit the farm, be sure to check out these unique machines. If you're lucky, you might even get a demonstration.
