Ole Barn Becomes New Start for Third Grade Field Trip

In Fall 2018, the schedule for the third grade Farm Life field trip program was modified to incorporate the 1850s barn. To highlight this "new" addition to the farm, the field trip now begins inside the barn. Starting in the 1850s barn sets the scene for what the students will be learning and experiencing during their time on the farm. When the students arrive they are led across the farm property, around the side of the barn, and as they walk into the barn there is an excited chorus of ooohs and aaahs! They are instantly transported back in time! The expressions on their faces reflect the magical moment they are experiencing. The field trip begins with "Grandpa" explaining about the first people to live on this land, the Bay Miwok and Ohlone. The students then learn about the Russells and how the barn was constructed in 1850. Grandpa emphasizes how the barn was built by hand. He

points out the hand-hewn wood and the ax marks on the beams. He uses two wooden boards and a dowel to demonstrate mortise and tenon engineering used to connect the supporting beams of the barn. Then he points his flashlight at examples of the mortise and tenon in the barn structure.

Using the 1850s barn to start the field trip has greatly improved the experience for the students. Being able to bring the participants back in time and to facilitate an understanding of life in the San Ramon Valley long ago is the whole purpose of the field trip. The experience in the 1850s barn plays a pivotal role in telling the story.

Crab Feed Takes the Cake
