Due to Sheltering in Place, we have had no San Ramon Historic Foundation Board Meetings since February 26, 2020. We have kept in touch with each other and with Parks and Recreation employees via email, texts and phone calls. But on May 19, 2020, we had our first ZOOM Board Meeting! It was so wonderful to actually see and hear everyone and have a productive Board Meeting. Thanks to Brad Morrison for setting up our meeting and scheduling our next ZOOM meeting on June 22.

At the May Board Meeting, we discussed all our ongoing projects and events for the Farm. We received two grants which will provide funding for materials for our third grade program and the guided tour of the Farm. The Meat locker will be painted and the inside will be restored. The Garden Plan will be redesigned to create more plots and keep out varmints. The Sheep Barn has some repairs which will be completed soon. All of these projects are funded by membership dues and money raised at events sponsored by the San Ramon Historic Foundation. All the money raised goes directly into all the buildings on the farm and the general upkeep of our Historic Park. Some of these historic buildings go back to 1850, so it is important to maintain San Ramon's history for future generations



Due to directions from the Health Department of Contra Costa County, which the City of San Ramon must follow, the Historic Foundation had to cancel Sheep Shearing for April 25, 2020. We are also canceling OKTOBERFEST for October 3, 2020. Both of these popular events usually attract between 1500 to 2000 participants! They will both be back in 2021 with many additional activities. Tractor Museum on the Farm

Forest Home Farms has approximately 45 tractors and a number of antique farm engines in their inventory. Most are stored in the "tractor museum." The tractor inventory includes John Deere, International Harvester/Farmall, Case, Oliver, Massey Ferguson, Ford, Allis Chalmers and Caterpillar. The antique farm engines on display include two throttlegoverned engines by Fairbanks Morse (both ca.



1917), and throttle-governed engines by International Harvester (ca.1918-19220 and Maytag (ca. 1939). Hit-and-miss

governed engines include those from Baker (ca. 1919), De Laval (ca, 1919), Maytag (ca 1936), Nelson Brothers (ca. 1915), and a rare Peerless (ca. 1904-1913).

They may be seen whenever the park is open. They are also on display at the farm special events programs. Popular demonstrations by the "tractor guys" include the antique farm engines and a gasoline engine powered washing machine.
