

# **FOREST HOME FARMS** HISTORIC PARK

Located at 19953 San Ramon Valley Boulevard, San Ramon, Forest Home Farms is the current focus of the San Ramon Historic Foundation's efforts. The property was bequeathed to the City of San Ramon in the 1990s by its owner, Ruth Quayle Boone, with the understanding that it become a city park.

It is open Tuesday through Saturday from 10AM to 4PM, closed Sunday and Monday. Family groups are welcome to come and enjoy the rural farm atmosphere.

Abram Wilson, a San Ramon resident of 45 years and a dedicated Board member of the San Ramon Historic Foundation, is a cornerstone of our community.

Mr. Wilson has worked tirelessly to improve the city through his roles as Mayor, City Council member, and Parks Commissioner. Among his many accomplishments, he was instrumental in bringing music programs to the schools and advocating for community cultural events as president of the San Ramon Arts Council. A proud veteran, Mr. Wilson helped make the San Ramon Veterans Hall and Memorial Park possible. He did this all being a father of 2 children and is now enjoying being a grandfather, as well.

Some 25 years ago, Abram's role as a Parks Commissioner brought him to Forest Home Farms, then owned by the late Ruth Boone, where he promised on behalf of the City of San Ramon to preserve her property. When asked about his work for Forest Home Farms, Abram replied: "My goal now is to help the city keep its promise to protect and enhance the park...to make sure that it is here for the next generation."



Throughout the 17th century, the Ohlone Native American tribes inhabited the land we call home today. The Ohlone people, also referred to as the Costanoan (a Spanish term for "coast people"), were a mixture of groups with individual cultures rather than a single tribe. Notorious for their hunter-gatherer lifestyle, ornately weaved baskets, and seasonal ceremonial dances, the indigenous people flourished on the coast of California.

Specifically, in the San Ramon Valley, the Seunen and Souyen were the first residents. Residing in the Alamo, Tassajara, and South San Ramon Creeks, these Native Americans choose areas close to water supplies, before Spanish explorers arrived in the late 1700s. Their diet was varied, including acorns, seeds, fish, seafood, and root plants.

Fun fact: San Ramon was named after Roman Nonato, a Souyen Indian vaquero.



Motivated to Christianize the Native Americans, the Spanish government established missionaries along the coast of California. In 1797, Father Lasuén created Mission San José in present-day Fremont. Primarily, the Spanish focused on converting the indigenous people by forcing them to devote themselves to religious study multiple times a day. The males worked in the fields and in new trades like carpentry. The women and girls prepared food and cleaned their living areas, in addition to raising children.

Mission San José had a 30-piece orchestra of Indian musicians led by Fr. Narciso Durán. Estanislao, a Native American who led a revolt and fought the Mexican army for years, also resided in the area. In Mission San José's lifespan, over 2,000 indigenous people were converted. In 1868, the mission suffered an enormous earthquake which destroyed many of the buildings.
